

LENTEN EGGS BEGIN IN MARCH!

The Youth Education Committee has LENTEN EGGS as a weekly devotional for families, especially families with children/youth.

Once Per Week (Sundays are perfect) there is an "Easter Egg" to open, a prayer and an activity to work through as a family. The "eggs" are a great way have some family time before/after dinner or before bedtime. The intent is to help our younger learners experience the season of Lent in a way that helps them understand the wonderful gift/sacrifice that our God did for us.

There are 12 eggs: Ash Wednesday, Sundays of Lent (7), Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, Easter Sunday.

PASTOR'S CORNER

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent. This year we'll celebrate it on March 5th. What follows in an introduction to Lent from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (2003).

What we hear during Lent is the power and possibility of the paschal mystery, and that the way of the cross, the way to Easter, is through death. To appropriate the new life that is beyond the power of death means we must die with Christ who was raised for us. To live for Christ, we must die with him. New life requires a daily surrendering of the old life, letting go of the present order, so that we may embrace the new humanity. "I die every day!" asserts Paul (1 Corinthians 15:31). Resurrection necessitates death as a preceding act. The church's peculiar Lenten claim is that in dying we live, that all who are baptized into Christ are baptized into his death. To be raised with Christ means one must also die with Christ. In order to embrace the resurrection, we must experience the passion of Jesus. The way of the cross, the way to Easter, is through death of the "old self." In dying, we live.

Therefore, at the beginning of Lent, we are reminded that our possessions, our rulers, our empires, our projects, our families and even our lives do not last forever. "You are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19). The liturgies throughout Lent try to pry loose our fingers, one by one, from presumed securities and plunge us into unknown baptismal waters, waters that turn out to be not only our death tomb but surprisingly our womb of life. Rather than falling back into nothingness, we fall back on everlasting arms. Death? How can we fear what we have already undergone in baptism?

It is the power of the resurrection on the horizon ahead that draws us into repentance toward the cross and tomb. Through the intervention of God's gracious resurrection, lifelong changes in our values and behavior become possible. By turning from the end of the "old self" in us, Lenten repentance makes it possible for us to affirm joyfully, "Death is no more!" and to aim toward the landscape of the new age. Faithfully adhering to the Lenten journey of "prayer, fasting and almsgiving" leads to the destination of Easter.

During the final week, Holy Week, we hear the fullness of Christ's passion, his death, and resurrection. From Jesus 'triumphal entry into Jerusalem and on to the Triduum (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday), all of Holy Week focuses on the passion. As his followers, we travel Christ's path of servanthood through the Lord's Supper and the suffering of the cross toward the glory of Easter, all of which underscores the inseparable link between the death and resurrection of Jesus.

As I sit in my office, composing this text, listening to music selections for Lent and praying about what message to convey to the people of First Presbyterian Church, I am constantly interrupted by my barking dog, my mewing-deaf-blind cat and (God bless him) my husband. I also find that I can be interrupted by my own thoughts. What to cook for dinner? Did I communicate my adjudication schedule to the school? Have I rescheduled by dentist appointment? Did I actually put the laundry into the dryer? Did I remember to pay the section leaders?

The interruption of our everyday lives is *always* going to happen. How do we respond to these interruptions? Do we let the outside world dictate our response and/or our attitude?

My personal "mantra" for this year is RADICAL HOSPITATILY. How do I welcome or how do I extend kindness to *all* I encounter? Have I extended grace to the retail or grocery clerk? Have I made physical space as I drive to allow other drivers to merge? Am I looking for ways to make my workplace more inviting/welcoming/safe? Do I find opportunities for others to share their gifts?

We read in the Gospel of Matthew, "When I was hungry, you gave me something to eat, and when I was thirsty, you gave me something to drink. When I was a stranger, you welcomed me." How can you let Radical Hospitality become part of your everyday?

As we begin our journey into the season of Lent, my prayer for First Presbyterian is that we begin to embody Radical Hospitality in our communities, in our congregation, and in our lives. The music staff at First Presbyterian pray you can reflect, repent, and **act** during the month of March. We pray that the music you hear, sing and experience during March enables you to be filled as you are called to BE THE PEOPLE OF GOD.



First Pres Finances in Brief As of January 31, 2025

This page is a new feature planned for the *First Epistle* to share a monthly snapshot of church finances. We want the First Pres family to understand our resources, our priorities, and our progress over time.

January notes: Spending overtook income by a large amount due to emergency repairs to the church heating system. Future spending should align more closely with the budget. We have just kicked off the Capital Campaign, and we are still receiving some of the last pledges for the new year.

For 2025 the church operates with a deficit budget (budgeted spending is larger than budgeted income). Annual pledges have decreased while annual expenses have increased. We rely on gifts and income beyond pledges to help close the gap. The Session continues to look for ways to reduce future expenses while maintaining our church and mission.

Short-term negative General Fund balances are covered by Designated Funds held in the same bank account, much like a savings account may back up a personal checking account.

(12/31/24) The Endowment Fund balance is reported quarterly.

General Fund Income: includes things like annual pledges, weekly offerings, building use and rent income.

General Fund Spending: includes staff payroll, physical operations, repairs and utilities, mission giving, and other budgeted expenses.

Designated Funds: include money that may only be used for specific purposes, like the Deacons Fund, the Food Pantry, special music programming, memorial funds, etc.

- **The Endowment Fund:** is managed to maintain a capital amount of \$2.1M that is invested and cannot be spent. Endowment earnings over and above the capital contribute to both the General Fund and various Designated Funds.
- **The Capital Campaign:** was established to fund specific improvements to the sanctuary, the chapel, and other building needs that are not funded by the general budget or grants.
- **The JLGLM Pledge:** was made by the church to the Justice League of Greater Lansing MI to contribute voluntary reparations for the benefit of Lansing's African American community.

SESSION NOTES

The Session revised the Capital Campaign to raise funds for church improvements to \$100,000. A letter sent to the membership outlines the projects. Darla Jackson and Dan DeYonke have been nominated as elders to fill two positions on the Session. Elliot Ryser resigned from Session and is moving his membership to the Okemos Presbyterian Church. Don Heck resigned from Session. The membership committee has compiled a list of members and would like folks to review the list and give them feedback about folks that may want to be removed from the list.



EARTH CARE TEAM

The Earth Care shelf in our library continues to expand. Of particular interest is *Climate Church, Climate World* by Jim Antal, who writes from the perspective of a long-time climate activist, denominational leader of the United Church of Christ, and public theologian. The author presents climate issues from many perspectives, including the science of climate change, its impact on people (refugees, poverty, inequality deadly viruses war) and sin as we destroy what God has created. Reverend Antal declares climate change a moral issue that all churches need to address. He provides many recommendations and examples of actions churches may consider adopting. This book is accessible and thought provoking, a must read for members of faith communities.

MISSION AND SOCIAL JUSTICE NOTES

The Mission committee welcomed Darla Jackson to the committee. Funds were allocated to the food pantry and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for the fires in California.

Who grows the cacao in your chocolate?



While chocolate is considered a luxury for many of us, for small-scale farmers worldwide, it is their source of necessary income that often comes with the harsh realities of corporate control of the industry.

The cocoa industry is highly consolidated with only four companies—Hershey, Lindt, Mondelēz, and Nestlé—controlling nearly 90% of the chocolate market, giving them a huge amount of control over cacao farmers and the prices we see on the supermarket shelves; they made roughly \$15 billion in profits since 2020."

Equal Exchange partners are smallholder farmers who are proud of their work and want to sell organic cacao, sugar, and vanilla for use in delicious chocolate through a fair system.

Equal Exchange products have full traceability back to our farmer cooperative partners. We guarantee a minimum price to the cooperatives and pay higher prices for the work that goes into **organic** cocoa production.

Additionally, the advance credit our partners receive helps them weather the ups and downs of the market. This is even more important now that the price of cacao is at an all-time high and cooperatives are strained to finance the prompt purchasing of high-value cacao from their members. Advanced credit enables cooperatives to pay their farmer members earlier while continuing to guarantee supply to buyers, even when faced with new buyers competing for limited beans in the global market.

Your support of this model is crucial to the sustainability of fairly produced and delicious chocolate!




Tuesday, March 4, 7:00 p.m. on Zoom James by Percival Everett

When the enslaved Jim overhears that he is about to be sold to a man in New Orleans, separated from his wife and daughter forever, he decides to hide on nearby Jackson Island until he can formulate a plan. Meanwhile, Huck Finn has faked his own death to escape his violent father, recently returned to town. As all readers of American literature know, thus begins the dangerous journey by raft down the Mississippi River toward the elusive and too-often-unreliable promise of the Free States and beyond. While many narrative set pieces of *The Adventures of Huckleberry*



Finn remain in place (floods and storms, stumbling across both unexpected death and unexpected treasure in the myriad stopping points along the river's banks, encountering the scam artists posing as the Duke and Dauphin...), Jim's agency, intelligence and compassion are shown in a radically new light. Tuesday, April 1, 7:00 p.m. on Zoom The Little Liar by Mitch Albom




Eleven-year-old Nico Krispis has never told a lie. When the Nazis invade his home in Salonika, Greece, the trustworthy boy is discovered by a German officer, who offers him a chance to save his family. All Nico has to do is persuade his fellow Jewish residents to board trains heading "north," where new jobs and safety await. Unaware that this is all a cruel ruse, the innocent boy reassures passengers on the station platform every day. But when the final train is loaded, Nico sees his family being herded into a boxcar. Only then does he discover that he has helped send them—and everyone he knows and loves—to their doom at Auschwitz. Nico escapes—but he never tells the truth again.

In *The Little Liar*, Mitch Albom examines the human repercussions of deception by interweaving the stories of Nico, who yearns for forgiveness; his older brother, Sebastian, who vows revenge against him; Fannie, the girl who must choose between them; and Udo Graf, the Nazi officer who forever changed their lives with his lies. Discussion led by Linda Diepenhorst.

Tuesday May 6, 7:00 in the parlor The Book of Lost Friends by Lisa Wingate

Louisiana, 1875: In the tumultuous era of Reconstruction, three young women set off as unwilling companions on a perilous quest: Hannie, a freed slave; Lavinia, the pampered heir to a now destitute plantation; and Juneau Jane, Lavinia's Creole halfsister. Each carries private wounds and powerful secrets as they head for Texas, following roads rife with vigilantes and soldiers still fighting a war lost a decade before. For Lavinia and Juneau Jane, the journey is one of stolen inheritance and financial desperation, but for Hannie, torn from her mother and siblings before slavery's end, the pilgrimage west reignites an agonizing question: Could her long-lost family still be out there? Beyond the swamps lie the limitless frontiers of Texas and, improbably, hope. Discussion led by Victoria Fitton.
