FROM THE PASTOR

This year Pentecost falls on 5/19. Here's a little background from *The Companion to the Book of Common Worship*, 2003:

According to the Day of Pentecost story in Acts 2:1-13, God gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower witnesses to the resurrection. Sounds from heaven, cosmic language, the rush of a mighty *ruach* (wind, spirit, breath) invaded the house in which the apostles gathered and appeared to them as a burning fire. Tongues of fire touched their nerve centers. A power — the unseen power of God — moved among them and gripped them. The Holy Spirit is unseen, like the wind, which is why the Old Testament calls it *ruach YHWH*, "the wind, or breath, of God" (cf. John 3:8). The Spirit is the "unseenness of God" working among us.


According to Joel (2:28-29) the *ruach* is to open everybody to God's future. People young and old will dream and will have visions of hope; they will be able to loose themselves from the way things are now, because God is establishing a whole new economy of creation. The Holy Spirit breaks us out of our preoccupation with ourselves and frees us to serve neighbors, loosens our grasp on possessions, and sets us to loving people. New creation is what Joel is talking about. Pentecost is new creation.

The book of Acts tells the story of the outcome of Pentecost's new creation: people witness in word and in deed to the risen Christ. At the outset, the newborn

church immediately tumbled out into the streets to witness to God's mighty works in the languages of people all over the world. By the end of the story, a tiny, Spirit-filled community of faith that broke from its present order has spread across the continents with incredible power to bring new things into being. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible....

Therefore, on the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate God's gift of the Holy Spirit which draws us together as one people, helps us to comprehend what God is doing in the world, and empowers us to proclaim, in word and in deed, God's plan of reconciling all people in the name of Christ (Ephesians 1:10).

Without the gift of the Spirit, Christ's church dries up and withers away, and we are left with only our broken selves. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible. A spirit-filled community of faith opens eyes to needs in the world and sees its missing as God's new people. The Day of Pentecost is the climax of the Great Fifty Days of Easter, celebrating as it does the gift of the Spirit to the body of Christ — the church.

Does it have any legitimacy today? This question is closely related to the "idealization" of America, even its possible uniqueness among the nations of the world as it made its inevitable way westward. At the same time, there is a long history, even while we were yet colonies, of a *brokenness* to our society. That is, there have been serious clashes short of secession based not only on politics, but religion, geography, "States' rights," etc. That plague comes down to our own fragmented time. What do you make of this national debate in a crucial election year? **Charlie Herrick** will attempt in one hour to draw together insights from recent books and articles to lead us.


SPRING GARDENING: SATURDAY, MAY 4, 9:00 - NOON!

As a botanist, Robin Wall Kimmerer has been trained to ask questions of nature with the tools of science. Drawing on her life as an indigenous scientist, Kimmerer shows how other living beings—asters and goldenrod, strawberries and squash, salamanders, algae, and sweetgrass—offer us gifts and lessons, even if we've forgotten how to hear their voices. Her reflections circle toward a central argument: that the awakening of ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings will we be capable of understanding the generosity of the earth and learn to give our own gifts in return. Discussion led by Doris Drake.

Tuesday June 4, 6:30 in the parlor Remarkably Bright Creatures by Shelby Van Pelt




After Tova Sullivan's husband died, she began working the night shift at the Sowell Bay Aquarium, mopping floors and tidying up. Keeping busy has always helped her cope, which she's been doing since her eighteen-year-old son, Erik, mysteriously vanished on a boat in Puget Sound over thirty years ago. Tova becomes acquainted with curmudgeonly Marcellus, a giant Pacific octopus living at the aquarium. Marcellus knows more than anyone can imagine but wouldn't dream of lifting one of his eight arms for his human captors—until he forms a remarkable friendship with Tova. Ever the detective, Marcellus deduces

what happened the night Tova's son disappeared. And now Marcellus must use every trick his old invertebrate body can muster to unearth the truth for her before it's too late. Discussion led by Sharon Carr.



Tuesday July 2, 6:30 in the parlor The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store by James McBride

In 1972, when workers in Pottstown, Pennsylvania, were digging the foundations for a new development, the last thing they expected to find was a skeleton at the bottom of a well. Who the skeleton was and how it got there were two of the long-held secrets kept by the residents of Chicken Hill, the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and African Americans lived side by side and shared ambitions and sorrows. Chicken Hill was where Moshe and Chona Ludlow lived when Moshe integrated his theater and where Chona ran the Heaven & Earth Grocery Store. As these characters' stories overlap and deepen, it becomes clear how much the people who live on the margins of white, Christian



America struggle and what they must do to survive. When the truth is finally revealed about what happened on Chicken Hill and the part the town's white establishment played in it, McBride shows us that even in dark times, it is love and community—heaven and earth—that sustain us. Discussion led by Linda Diepenhorst.

Overture for General Assembly 2024 On Becoming Free from Plastic Pollution from Presbyterians for Earth Care

The Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley overtures for the 226th General Assembly (2024) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to commit ourselves as a church, a people of faith and a social organization embodying Christian values, to:

- 1. Encourage all our settings to commit to changing from a disposable culture to a reusable, sustainable one.
- 2. Encourage education within our congregations and in our communities to advocate for alternatives to single use plastics, whether through mitigation efforts and campaigns or by supporting local and state bans on single use plastics, and
- 3. Encourage all settings of the Church to determine the best pathway forward for strategies and actions to mitigate plastic pollution.
- 4. Reduce the use of single-use plastics and packaging.
- 5. Commend all settings of the church to join in possible opportunities for participation in addressing plastic pollution.

In the same way, CEPAD walks alongside those in rural communities who have been oppressed for many years without the opportunities to own land, get an advanced education, or receive proper medical attention.

The Lake Michigan Presbytery Nicaraguan Partnership Committee is planning a trip for September 2024. The project for the group will be assembling and installing water filters in homes.
